

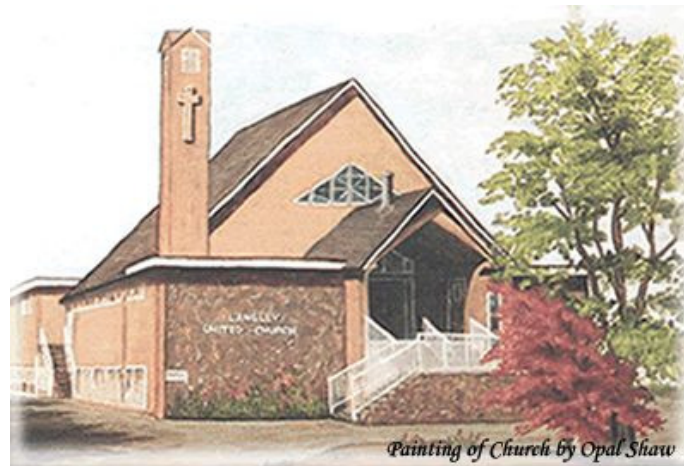

CLERGY REPORT - Rev. Rod MacKinnon

9 Love must be completely sincere. Serve the Lord with a heart full of devotion. 12 Let your hope keep you joyful, be patient in your troubles, and pray at all times. 13 Share your belongings with your needy Christian brothers, and open your home to strangers. Paul certainly gave a lot of advice to the church in his letter to the Romans. Of the many points he encouraged the church to do, I believe we have covered most of these in our work this year. I know that we have learned and practiced the art of hosting and convening conversations with our neighboring United Churches in Langley. I believe that the many planning meetings, group gatherings and conversations with our brothers and sisters of the United Churches of Langley have been valuable and enriching for us. We have discovered what we want to be and that we want to work at work together on the things that matter most to us. This has been exciting work in discerning what we can create together.

Our aim as the United Church in Langley is to be:

- thriving congregations
- vital to the community
- alive as followers of Jesus Christ
- sustainable for the future.

We are discovering the wonderful possibilities of shared ministry for the community that we serve. Those who have been involved have been energized by the visions of possibilities ahead of us. We have made discoveries about what we can do better together rather than alone, but our work is just beginning. I know that as you read the reports of others in this Annual Report document you will get a sense of the wonderful possibilities for future growth and development ahead of us.

Part of my ministry is also to represent the congregation in the broader community. My involvement with the Langley Association of Christian Churches and in particular our work as the Spiritual Care Team at Langley Memorial Hospital has been difficult this year. The loss of a Chaplain at the hospital and indeed the dismantling of the Spiritual Care network in the Fraser Health Region has created a crisis providing spiritual care at Langley Memorial Hospital. We are presently advocating for the return of this critical ministry.

Along with our weekly worship services, I include the following specific ministry responsibilities:

- * Sacrament of Communion celebrated fourteen times
- * Sacrament of Baptism celebrated eight times
- * Covenant of Marriage offered ten times
- * Memorial or Funeral Services conducted eleven times
- * Christmas Eve offered two services
- * Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services.
- * Worship Services at Langley Lodge (special care) offered nine times
- * Worship at Harrison Landing (congregate and assisted living) offered ten times
- * I serve on the Education and Students' Committee of Fraser Presbytery

Rosa Flinton-Brown

Thank you for your encouragement during my first year as Chairperson of the Board! It has been a wonderful year of working and learning together with lots of laughter and thoughtfulness. I am amazed by the number of activities our church hosts each year! Heartfelt thanks to all our volunteers!

At the close of 2008, we wondered how Langley United would respond to the challenges highlighted by Derek Evans' report to the Fraser Presbytery. Shortly after our AGM last year, a gathering of people from all the United Churches in Langley met at Sharon United to discuss our vision for the future. From this meeting and meetings between other churches throughout the Fraser Presbytery, our mission became clear. We wanted "to face our present and future reality and make choices that leave us thriving, vital, living and sustainable."

The United Churches in the Langley area immediately responded to the challenge of facing our reality and beginning to make choices. We formed the Langley Futures Initiative (LFI) Steering Committee, a group of laity and ministers from all the Langley United churches who wanted to

explore how we could share our ministries and realize our mission.

With financial support from the Fraser Presbytery's Lower Mainland Mission Enhancement Fund, we hired Chris Corrigan to help us learn to "host conversations that matter". Thirty-five people from the churches in Langley attended including most members of the LUC Board. We are using the principles and processes we learned at this October 4-6 workshop to guide our meetings and gatherings.

Since October we have held five conversations. People from all the United Churches in Langley have come together to share our gifts and passions. We have discussed possible visions for our future, how to better share our children and youth ministries and what the wider community may need from the United Church. Over one hundred people from the various congregations have participated in these meetings, building friendships with each other and discerning our future.

At each Board meeting, we have spent a significant amount of time discussing the work of LFI and its implications for Langley United. It has been rewarding and thought provoking as we share our hopes and fears, always keeping

the mission of Langley United and the United Church of Canada in our hearts and minds.

We hope that you will consider attending our next LFI meeting. Our next conversation will be held on February 6, 2010 at Sharon United from 9 AM – 12 PM. We will be discussing how we can organize and structure ourselves to better respond to Christ's call to us.

At this year's Annual General Meeting, we plan to officially adopt our new governance model and constitution. If you would like to review it in detail before the meeting, it is available from the Langley United Church website or from the church office.

Finally, I ask that you keep our Board in your prayers during the year ahead. We truly appreciate your trust and support.

MUSIC Tim Bailey

We have had a wonderful year musically at Langley United Church. I'll admit to having a biased opinion of course. It has been exciting to work with Rod, Sharon, the choir and everyone here. It has been challenging but very rewarding as well. I would like to send a special thank you out to Greg Caisley along with Calla, Lindsay and Katie for presenting the "Night on Broadway" concert on February 20. I was very happy to enjoy it from the audience. Our other events last year were the concert by the Sound Revival Quartet, the War's Embers concert and of course the 9th annual "Under the Mistletoe" concert. We also participated in the LACC Ecumenical Service on December 6. The choir presented two major

musical works with the cantatas "Song of the Shadows" on Good Friday and "The Mystery and the Majesty" on December 20. Thanks again to all the readers, production assistants, sound technicians, food and coffee providers and the entire congregation for their help and support with our endeavours. Financial profits from our fundraising concerts were very close to \$3900.00.

It has been wonderful working with Sharon. I can't thank her enough for her work and assistance both behind the scenes and of course her talents on the piano and organ. She has also taken on starting the Children's Choir which I think has been very successful (a separate report follows). I have really enjoyed directing the choir and they have worked hard and sung wonderfully. I have to admit (sheepishly) that very little would get done without Maureen Burgess. We have bought a lot of new music (under our budget though) and worked diligently to sing it well. The choir sounds very good but we could always use more voices (attention men) and anyone who likes to sing is very welcome to come and join us. We are always looking for instrumentalists as well. I try to incorporate other instruments often and would like to delve further into the talents available. Barry deserves

a special thank you for organizing our horn section as well as transcription, transposition and arranging duties. I am looking forward to another year of wonderful music and fellowship.

CHILDREN'S CHOIR Sharon Prindle-Collins

A new addition to the music program this year was the LUC Children's Choir. With Sharon directing and Tim playing we have been practicing right after church in the Lounge with our small but committed group.

The Children's Choir has sung a variety of music, and participated in the special worship services for Thanksgiving, Remembrance Day, and Christmas Eve, as well as in the Mistletoe Concert. It has been a real pleasure working with these enthusiastic young singers, and we have been impressed with their singing. We are looking forward to singing some fun pieces in the New Year, so if you know any young singers in Grades 1 - 7 please let us know about them!

CHILDREN AND FAMILY MINISTRIES Rev. Gabrielle Suedfeld

The Sunday programme for our younger members continues to

be an active part of church life at Langley United. All those involved are committed to giving children a comfortable and safe place to explore their faith, a sense of the sacred, an understanding of the biblical stories, an awareness of the social issues of our community, and a feeling of the joy that comes in following the teachings of Jesus and belonging to this special family of God.

Our classes

We celebrate the beginning of the toddler group, ages 2-5, set up by Lois Dickson and Shelley Matheson. This has been a wonderful addition to our Sunday programme.

Godly Play continued with Gabrielle Suedfeld, with Heather Mackenzie and others as shepherds in the spring and Lisa Garland in the fall. Heather and Jan Miscich led this age group in April and May.

Rosa Flinton-Brown was group leader for grades 3-4 in the spring, and grades 4-6 in the fall. Lisa Garland led the older children, grades 5-7 in the spring. Many other people helped out when necessary in these classes.

Godly Play used their special materials and format. In the spring, there was a focus on the parables, and in the fall, on the

story of Joseph, followed by the adventures of the prophets.

The other classes based their activities on the Whole People of God curriculum. This is a lectionary based source, available online for all ages. The intermediate class, under Rosa's direction, spent some of the fall in a study of the Lord's Prayer.

One of the highlights of the fall classes was the all-class participation in the Feast of Esther, a traditional Jewish event with story, costumes, lots of noise (which could be heard upstairs in the adult part of the service) and special pastries.

Our rooms

During the spring and summer months, the classrooms were cleaned and painted. Godly Play was set up with more permanent shelving and displays. Our thanks to all those who scrubbed, painted, laid carpet and moved furniture to give our children beautiful spaces to enjoy. We also thank the UCW for supplying the blinds in two of the rooms and bookcases for the Godly Play area.

Our storage area was moved, sorted, cleaned and reorganized, with the help of Francis Switzer, Bill Pike,

Kellie Warnock, Rosa Flinton-Brown and Margaret Rowell. It was a big job, done by many willing hands.

Worship with our children

Most classes begin with a short worship ritual, after children have come down from the sanctuary where they have lit the Christ Candle, heard a story and offered a song. During Lent, we enjoyed the colourful additions to the sanctuary worship space, as a rainbow was created each week. There were services for all ages at Easter, Pentecost, "Welcome Home" Sunday in September, Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve.

A wonderful addition to the children's worship experience has been the formation of the Children's Choir, led by Sharon Prindle-Collins and Tim Bailey. This has been a joy for all who participate, and we have discovered some very beautiful voices!

All the children were present when Benjamin Abbot was baptized. It is always meaningful to reaffirm our faith at any age, as we witness God's love in this sacrament with the families of children we see each Sunday.

FINANCE

We leave 2009 and approach the 2010 Olympic excitement with a little of our own congregational excitement. There have been many positive happenings which you can read from the other reports herein. This will relate the Financial happenings.

We have closed out fiscal 2009

with no bank overdraft. Yes, the \$50,000.+ overdraft of 2007 has been eliminated over the last two years. Although, at time of writing, the 2010 budget has not been finalized, we should be able to add some funding for youth choir plus extra Sunday school funds to accommodate the increased attendance. This outcome has come about in conjunction with the ongoing ability to carry out our regular in church and outreach programs.

A groundswell of diverse enthusiasms has helped our congregation to achieve this. There has been a great positive response to the Enrolment of many onto the PAR program. This creates an ongoing steady and reliable stream of funding, allowing our treasurer to keep bills paid current and avoid either late payment or bank overdraft fees. This of course is augmented by the regular Sunday Envelopes and Loose Offerings. An extra Thank You goes to some very generous persons who topped up at year end and brought the Offerings nearly equal to the Budget.

On the expense side, there have also been great happenings. Pat Thebaud and the Worship Committee did a masterful job of providing Sunday Supply with Services conducted by a number of our own groups, i.e. The Jam Session, the Choir, and the Worship Committee

themselves. They were not only wonderful services but there was no cost to our Budget. A great big Thank You goes to Gabrielle Suedfeld who did a number of services pro bono. And a big Thank You to Rod who has provided a great year of Programs and Ministry within a good fiscal framework.

Our building saw the completion of cleaning and painting on the remainder of the Lower Hall rooms, plus the cleaning and waxing of the Lower Hall Floor. This was done by volunteers, so again very little budget impact.

There seems to be a common thread of Volunteerism to all of this. And this very volunteerism makes us a better Congregation for it. From all the Sunday School Volunteers, the UCW activities, the sanctuary decorators, the fundraising activities, committee volunteers, sound & video volunteers, counters, drivers, coffee providers, and many others, to the Treasurer Eileen Anderson and Envelope Secretary Bill Pike who provide a huge and wonderful service to our congregation. THANK YOU

So, going into 2010, let's try to reach a little higher, so that our programs can go a little further. Bon 2010. The Finance Committee

PRESBYTERY

Langley United is one of the pastoral charges in Fraser Presbytery. Our presbytery extends from Hope to White Rock and includes St. Andrew's in Maple Ridge and Whonnock

Webster's Corner. Presbytery has many responsibilities and work to attend to during the year. Our committees include Pastoral Relations, Education and Students, Presbytery Oversight, Church Development, Finances, Pensions, Home Missions, Property, Discipleship, Resource Centre, YAYA Ministry, Global Concerns, Stewardship. Cultus Lake is part of the Fraser Presbytery. The clergy and lay representatives are responsible to see that this work is done.

The first Full Court meeting of 2009 was held at Crescent United on March 6th and 7th. Chris Corrigan reported on Phase 2 of the consultation regarding the future of pastoral charges in Fraser Presbytery. People want thriving congregations, vital to the community, alive as followers of Jesus Christ, sustainable for the future. The task at hand will be to fulfil this desire by looking at the kind of change we need to undertake collectively. At this meeting, we also had Hilde Seal, President of BC Conference address the court and recognized Heather Mackenzie for her ministry with the Resource Centre.

Fall 2009 began with a September 24th meeting at Crossroads United Church to discuss a framework for strategic planning for Phase 3 of

the future of pastoral charges in Fraser Presbytery. The Full Court met at Sharon United Church on October 16th and 17th to discuss the Phase 3 "Vision for Mission" proposal which included the 2010 proposed budget, and the future of YAYA ministry. Rev. Ric Matthews from First United Church Mission led a workshop on what it means to be vital to the community.

On November 24th, presbyters gathered at Aldergrove United and after much passionate debate passed the Phase 3 "Vision for Mission" proposal which includes "Mission, Vision and Values, and Strategic Directions" statements; ending the staffing position of YAYA minister in Fraser Presbytery effective June 30th, 2010; the 2010 proposed budget; and the establishment of a task group for "Vision for Mission".

The coming year will be challenging as we work together to discover new ways to be the United Church in Fraser Presbytery.

The 80th General Meeting of the BC Conference was held in Langley in May. It was a very busy time with guest speakers, discussion sessions, information sessions and of course business times. It was a time of connecting with people from across the province.

A meeting of Fraser Presbytery was held during the BC Conf

meeting. Much of the meeting was devoted to the amalgamation of the Royal Heights and Strawberry Hill Pastoral Charges and the sale of the Royal Heights property.

The June meeting of Fraser Presbytery dealt with funding for the Langley Futures Initiative and the Environics study. Rev. Joan McMurtry of First United White Rock started her term as Presbytery chair.

UCW Arlene Pike

The UCW holds regular meetings the first Monday of every month at 1:30 pm in the lower hall. We have a business meeting usually followed by a program and refreshments. All ladies are welcome.

Our January meeting consisted of the installation of officers and a Bible Study. In February we had a study of some women of the Bible. In February we also had our annual Beef Dinner. March was our annual Birthday Lunch; in April we discussed our goals as a UCW group, and in May we had a lawyer talk to us about legal “stuff” we should all know. In June we had a Strawberry tea and a picnic.

We started the fall season with a potluck lunch on September 14, 2009. In October we had an informative talk on Fraser

Health Services. In November we asked Rod MacKinnon to tell his life’s journey. December 5th was our Holly Luncheon and Bazaar. December’s meeting was a Christmas party with carols and Christmas stories to start Advent off right.

We have continued with our usual projects including parties at Langley Lodge and Highland Villa once a month with goodies and entertainment. At Christmas we sent cards to our shut-ins. We also support a student through the ACCES program, VST, First United, Christmas hampers, and our church. This fall we have had several pie and coffee fundraisers at coffee hour to raise money to paint the outside of the church. We challenge other groups to think of ways to add to the fund! We are a busy group as you can see, but we can always use more help. Come and join us!

NICOMEKL BREAKFAST PROGRAM Maureen Burgess
